

Briefing on Gaelic Education

May 2014







1. Strategic Objective: Build a world-class curriculum for all learners in Scotland

- **1.1** The following learning resources are now published to support the **senior phase**:
 - National 3 Gaelic (Learners)
 - Higher Gaelic (Learners)
 - National 3 Gàidhlig
 - Higher Gàidhlig
 - National 3 GM modern studies
 - National 3 GM geography
 - National 5 GM mathematics.
- **1.2** The publication of the following learning resources are also planned to support the **senior phase**:
 - National 4 GM mathematics
 - National 3 GM Lifeskills mathematics
 - National 4 GM Lifeskills mathematics
 - Higher GM History
 - Higher GM Geography
 - Higher GM Modern Studies.
- **1.3** Schools and education authorities are invited to advise Education Scotland of the subjects that they are offering in the senior phase through the medium of Gaelic. Based on responses we will receive, we will translate learning materials that Education Scotland will be commissioning. Education Scotland acknowledges the co-operation of education authorities in sharing materials they themselves have produced for the new qualifications and are made available on our website.
- **1.4** Education Scotland, in partnership with the Scottish Qualifications Authority (SQA), published **Route Maps through Assessment**. These provide main messages and links for National 4 and National 5. Route maps will also be developed for the new Higher courses and these will be available from the start of the new session.

- **1.5** Education Scotland has supported Stòrlann Nàiseanta na Gàidhlig with a resource pack for Gaelic Medium Education to develop learning on **Commonwealth Games**. This pack has potential to be used as part of interdisciplinary learning.
- **1.6** Education Scotland, in partnership with the Scottish Toponymy in Transition project, University of Glasgow, have prepared learning and teaching ideas to develop children and young people's understanding of **Scotland's placenames**. At the early/first level, learners study and explore the local environment, look at common place names and directions and create personal maps of the local environment. At the Second level, learners will look at the study and interpretation of Ordnance Survey maps as well as interviewing local family members about local place/street names. At the Third level, learners will develop an understanding of how place names have evolved and work collaboratively to create an information booklet. At the Third/Fourth level, learners will gain insight into using a variety of maps to compare place name changes over time and present local maps and the stories attached to them. - **1.7 SSLN: Literacy Writing** This professional learning resource uses results from the Scottish Survey of Literacy and Numeracy (SSLN) to promote and inform professional reflection, dialogue and debate about writing and how to improve it.
- **1.8 John Muir Education Pack** This resource aims to help teachers understand outdoor learning opportunities, and give confidence to use outdoor spaces for teaching a wide range of experiences and outcomes. The pack for second level encourages structured learning in the outdoors, along with a deeper understanding of John Muir's writings and philosophies. The pack can be used flexibility as stand-alone activities to cover certain aspects of the topic or as activities leading into each other as a programme of learning. The Second Level pack can help with an introduction to the John Muir Award.

2. Strategic Objective: Promote high-quality professional learning and leadership amongst education practitioners

2.1 Education Scotland's Gaelic Education website, <u>Stòras na Gàidhlig</u> is being reviewed. It now has a section which details new information on Gaelic Learner and Medium Education, as well as Learning about Gaelic Language and Culture. A section has been developed with "Briefings on Gaelic Education". We are continuing to review and update Stòras na Gàidhlig to be more responsive to user needs and to give access to high-quality information on Gaelic Education. 3. Strategic Objective: Build the capacity of education providers to improve continuously their performance

- **3.1** Education Scotland supported career-long professional learning in Gaelic Education on
 - Assessment and moderation in the broad general education
 - Language Learning in Scotland: A 1 + 2 Approach
 - Using inspection evidence to inform National Guidance on Gaelic Education.
- **3.2** Revised national guidance for <u>Professional Review and Development</u> (PRD) has been published on the Education Scotland website. The guidance is structured around key features of effective PRD processes. It will support teachers, headteachers and system leaders to engage positively in these processes and to improve outcomes for children and young people. It includes links to helpful resources and reflective questions to support self-evaluation and professional dialogue.
- **3.3** <u>Mentoring Matters</u> is an online tool to support and develop mentoring skills for teachers at every stage of their career. Please visit the website to view the latest materials.

4. Strategic Objective: Influence national policy through evidence-based advice

4.1 Education Scotland, in partnership with practitioners, are producing a framework for the teaching of languages to **P2-7 as part of Language Learning in Scotland: A 1 + 2 Approach.** Gaelic Education is represented by a headteacher whose school's curriculum includes Gaelic Learner and Medium Education 3-12 as well as a visiting teacher of Gaelic Learner Education. The framework will be cognisant of the Education Scotland advice, The Role of Gaelic Education in a 1+2 Approach. The Role of Gaelic Education in a 1+2 Language Approach

5. Future priorities

- **5.1** The <u>CFE Implementation Plan</u> **2014-15** sets out objectives with which Education Scotland will be supporting schools in the year ahead. These include some specific to Gaelic Education and others from which Gaelic will also benefit.
- **5.2** The team for Gaelic Education are currently matching priorities to funding. Our tentative projects specific to Gaelic are undernoted. Gaelic Education will also benefit from specialists in Gaelic Education working with other teams in Education Scotland, for example, assessment, parentzone.
 - Promote leadership in Gaelic Medium Education.
 - Develop a Gaelic Medium specific mentoring system for NQTs in Gaelic Medium Education and for teachers interested in taking on leadership roles in Gaelic Medium Education.
 - Develop diagnostic assessments to assess Gaelic language competency of course applicants for initial teacher education.
 - Audit CLPL specific to Gaelic Education.
 - Deliver a programme of CLPL including through Glow and conferences.
 - Compile key messages on the methodology and principles of Gaelic Medium Education, including total immersion.
 - Finalise and engage in implementation activities associated with the National Guidance on Gaelic Education.
 - Produce an implementation paper on learning and development through ICT.
 - Translation of Education Scotland learning resources to support Curriculum for Excellence.
 - Contribute to advisory groups for National Plan for Gaelic, for example, Adult Learning and Secondary Gaelic Medium Curriculum.
